January Chatterbox Newsletter




Living through the worst of the Covid-19 pandemic, we have recognized that many of the "demands and obligations" we felt tied to in our lives "pre-Covid" are actually self-constructed and self-imposed expectations of how to accomplish the things we wish to see in our lives. We have found that we don't have to drive 40 minutes, through traffic, into an office every day to accomplish the workload needed to achieve our desired outcomes. And the time that we spent having to be away from our homes "pre-Covid," can now be spent running a load of laundry, or mowing the lawn, or playing a card game with our kids, who also now have more time at home instead of being scheduled to the hilt with traveling to private lessons, and multiple school functions. All of a sudden, we do, in fact, have more hours in a day to accomplish all the things that "need" to be done.

Time, and the demands we place on it, seem much more flexible as we look forward, realizing that we have much more control over how we use our time than we ever thought. Our expectations of ourselves and how we relate to one another and the rest of the world are changing too. The very notion of "rest" is changing, and this reframing of "rest," or Sabbath living, is exactly the liberating expression Jesus speaks to in much of his ministry.

In the sixth chapter of Mark, Jesus and the disciples intentionally take a break, away from the crowds, to physically rest, but, Mark tells us in verse 34 "As he (Jesus) went ashore, he saw a great crowd; and he had compassion for them, because they were like sheep without a shepherd; and he began to teach them many things." And then, again in verse 56 "And wherever he went, into villages or cities or farms, they laid the sick in the marketplaces, and begged him that they might touch even the fringe of his cloak; and all who touched it were healed."

Jesus had compassion for them because "they were like sheep without a shepherd." Jesus does not engage these people out of obligation or demand, but rather from a sense of mercy, or shared humanity. This ministry with others is not work that fulfills a daily quota, but rather is the very purpose of his being - joining with God, in God's mission for creation. When you are acting with others, rather than acting for others, your activity is not work, but rather your very identity. It's is living into who you were created to be. And being most truly yourself, in a world seeking authenticity and fullness, is the "rest" Jesus is offering, not only here, but throughout the narrative gospels we have in our scripture.

Matthew's Gospel (11:28-30), shares this same sense of *me all who are weary and heavy burdened, and I will give you rest*" not about being left alone, or not having to work. True rest in these comes through being in relationship with everything and everyone engaging the world, in order to participate with God in the ongoing of God. Healing, curing, feeding, and teaching are activities of with the world that bring us most fully together as creation, and allows expression of the Kingdom of God among us. For Jesus, this activity It's a rest from all the misguided activities done out of obligation, fear of one another, and instead allows us to enter the flow of creation continues creating. When you are not working double-time, swimming



"rest." "Come to "Rest" here is scriptures around you, creative activity engagement for the fullest actually is rest. selfishness, or as God upstream against the current, just laying back and allowing yourself to move with the direction of the ongoing current can feel just like heaven. This is what Jesus shows us throughout his ministry. This reframing of our expectations of who we are and how we relate to one another is the transforming power of our Gospel, opening up for us, the very present possibility of the Kingdom of God.

The Poet David Whyte says, "The antidote for exhaustion is not rest, but wholeheartedness." In this New Year, may we follow Jesus' lead into wholeheartedness, and in this, find our true rest.

Give us faith to go out with good courage, not knowing where we go, but only that your hand is leading us and your love supporting us; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

St. John's Lutheran Church Council met with Pastor Chris, Brian Bunkers, Larry Wennekamp, Dave Groteluschen, Denise Stevenson and Tracey Moore present. Bethany Wilke was absent. President Tracey Moore called the meeting to order. Pastor Chris led the Council with an opening prayer.

Pastor's Report

Christmas is definitely coming! Our Angel tree is up, and all of the ornaments have been chosen to purchase gifts for those families we have adopted for our Christmas giving this year, as well as to purchase plants to be delivered to all of the folks who live in senior residential facilities or those who find it hard to be with us on Sunday for morning worship. Our worship series for Advent has been exploring how Christ is revealed through our Christmas Carols and we have had several families participating in worship by lighting the candles on our Advent wreath as they read and say a prayer each week. We have distributed Advent calendars to our children in Sunday School, as well as to our adults, and we have weekly Advent devotional booklets available for those who wish to participate in Advent through prayer practices.

Our Children's Christmas program is scheduled during our worship time on December 17th and the children have already been practicing, and are very excited about their presentation.

Our community is invited to be with our ecumenical church partners on Thursday December 14 for a "Blue Christmas" service, designed for those folks who have lost a loved one, a job, or have ended a close relationship, and find it hard to find joy in the midst of their grief during the holiday season. This service is open to all and will be held at the Federated Church in Columbus, beginning at 6:30pm.

St John's will be celebrating with two separate services on Christmas Eve this year: the first one is at 10:00am and we will be focusing on Mary's Magnificat song with special music by Donna Jaixen. The second service is our candlelight Lessons and Carols worship at 5:00 that evening. There will be no Christmas Day service this year, since we had two services the day before, and this will allow everyone a little more time with their families on Christmas morning, whether they are traveling far distances for a visit, or are just going around the corner.

Pastoral visitations continue with our folks in residential facilities and those in their homes. The weekend of Dec 17-19, I will be visiting and delivering communion, as well as delivering the flower arrangements ordered by the Social Ministries Committee. These gifts help keep our homebound residents connected to our community and they are greatly appreciated.

Adult Bible Study and Confirmation continues through December 18 and then they will both be on break throughout Christmas and New year's, resuming the week of January 7.

Our Music and worship team is surveying the congregation about the possibility of having communion in worship twice a month instead of just on the first Sunday of the month. The committee will present a report at the January council meeting, and if it is approved, we will begin this practice in the month of February and continue it throughout the Lenten and Easter church seasons. We can then review this practice again at the May Council meeting and see if this should become a permanent practice for our congregational worship.

Thank you all for continuing to support our ministry together here at St John's Lutheran Church, and I wish you all a joyful Christmas and a Happy New Year!
